This diversity extends to our children. Just as fruit appears under specific conditions, the development of a child may not always be immediately evident. Some children take longer to mature intellectually and spiritually, akin to fruits that require more time to grow. Each student is unique, like different fruits in a fruit salad, and we should celebrate these differences rather than trying to fit them into a single mould.

In today's fast-paced world, we often expect immediate results, forgetting that fruit, both literal and metaphorical, takes time to grow. Like tending to a fruit tree, nurturing our students' growth requires patience and care. We should provide them with the right environment for growth, just as a fruit tree needs proper care to bear fruit. As educators and

parents, we must provide them with the nourishment the need to grow and bear fruit.

We must also ensure that our students are rooted in truth and good principles. Without strong roots, a tree cannot withstand storms, and similarly, students need a solid foundation to thrive. We must also protect them from harmful influences, just as we would protect a fruit tree from pests and diseases. Our children face significant pressure, and we must help them manage the temptations and distractions of the world that stand in the way of them being fruitful.

Ultimately, the true measure of education, but especially Christian education, lies not in academic results but in the development of a child's character. We aim to cultivate the "fruit of the Spirit" in our students—love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. These qualities will benefit not only the students themselves but also the world around them.

PRIMARY SCHOOL HOCKEY


Our Hockey season for the Primary School started. We have entered
